What are the Catholic origins of Halloween?....

Even though Halloween has gained popularity in the secular world, its roots in Catholic tradition are very strong. The name itself is derived from All Hallow's Eve, or the Vigil of All Saints' Day, on which Catholics honor those who have gone before us and are now in our heavenly home. The Vigil of All Saints was a liturgical event according to the old Church calendar. It had its own Mass, at which the priest would wear purple veils of penitence, the traditional color of vigils. He would dress in white for the First Vespers of All Saints in the evening, which kicked off the Church's commemoration of this important holy day. A complete picture of the Catholic understanding of death and the afterlife was created by the Vigil (October 31), the Feast of All Saints (November 1), and the Commemoration of All Souls (November 2).

Catholic cultural practices were brought to America by emigrants from the European continent. The French are the originators of Halloween costumes. The Irish, who initially carved turnips, are the originators of pumpkin carving! These practices were condemned as paganism since most people in America were Protestant. With millions of children and adults dressing up as their favorite heroes, celebrities, ghouls, and goblins, Halloween has grown to be one of the most significant celebrations of the year in the modern world, especially in English-speaking nations.

We are reminded of the truth of Heaven and Hell, the saints, demons, angels, and all the holy souls who are undergoing purgatory by celebrating Halloween and the holy days that surround it. Halloween serves as a reminder to offer up prayers for the dead's souls. Additionally, it serves as a reminder that we too will pass away one day, therefore we should always work to live morally upright lives so we might see Jesus in heaven.

In this Sunday's Gospel we find the truth that loving God isn't merely a matter of fervor in our hearts, but that it must be expressed in doing good for the sake of others.
