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Posture during Mass....

We must remember two fundamental components of the Catholic Mass Order in order to properly understand the significance of the bodily gestures we make during the Mass.

- (1) **The priest acts as Jesus** As Jesus, he guides us through the various motions, customs, and rites that comprise the Catholic Mass Order. The priest sits and stands, and for this reason we too sit and stand. This explains also why other priests and altar servers bow as they approach the celebrant priest. By doing this, they are honoring Christ, who is symbolized by the priest.
- (2) **Jesus is present in the Eucharist -** The consecrated Eucharist contains the presence of Jesus, which is another crucial aspect of the Catholic Mass that we should understand. The theory of transubstantiation holds that at a specific moment during the Mass, the bread and wine take on the characteristics of Jesus. This is consistent with that teaching. The bread and wine are changed into the genuine body and blood of Christ while maintaining their outward aspect.

Why We Sit During the Mass – The posture used for meditation and listening is sitting. Every mass begins with us taking a seated position. Seated worship is regarded as the most basic stance. It is from this position that we may both stand and bow. During Mass, we listen to the first two readings from the Lectionary while seated.

Following the reading of the Gospel, we also take a seat and listen intently to the homily. We wait patiently for the preparation of the Eucharistic components, which is a very significant gesture, and we rise when the priest is ready.
