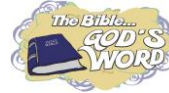
PASTOR'S CORNER

Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity. . . .

We are back in the liturgical season of Ordinary Time this week. However, this Sunday and the following Sunday are set aside as solemnities—special occasions that draw our attention to the fundamental secrets of our faith. We honor the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity today, the first Sunday following Pentecost.

This feast day challenges us to reflect on our beliefs regarding God, who has shown himself to us as the Trinity—one God existing in three Persons. The feast's central principle is the dogma of faith: there is only one God, and inside that one God are three Divine Persons: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. However, there is only one everlasting, incomprehensible God, not three!

This celebration ought to remind us that, in reality, every Sunday is set aside to celebrate the Most Holy Trinity, and that each Sunday is a day set aside to sanctify and adore the Godhead. We ought to be mindful of the blessings that the Blessed Trinity is giving us every Sunday and do so with appreciation. From the first day of the week, the Father started the process of creating us, even though He had already predetermined us. Sunday marks the "Day of the Lord," or the day that the Son rose from the dead to save us. It was on Sunday when the Holy Spirit fell upon the fledgling Church, sanctifying us and making us His temple. Consequently, the Most Holy Trinity is observed on Sundays.

"The mystery of the Most Holy Trinity is the central mystery of Christian faith and life," as the Catholic Catechism correctly states (number 234). We may never fully understand the God who saves us while we are here on earth, but it doesn't mean we should give up on God or the will of God for our lives. Rather, it means that we should continue to proclaim the gospel with the lives we lead. Scripture teaches that God is Love, that whoever lives in Love lives in God, and that God is in the one who loves. Let us make God the focus of our lives and visit him often for adoration, prayer, praise, petitions, and gratitude. It is always the correct thing to do, and it actually provides us with support and encouragement for day-to-day living.

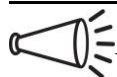
Vocation Chalice - If you'd like to take it home to pray for vocations, be sure to use the sign up cards in the back of the Church.
