Important Facts about Easter Every Catholic Should Know. . .

Easter isn't just one day when Catholics celebrate the resurrection of Christ. A whole season is involved! "Easter is the most important liturgical time for Catholics," states the USCCB (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops), citing it as the main feast of the liturgical year. It commemorates the victory of Jesus over sin, death, and human salvation. God's redemption of humanity is the pinnacle of his love.

- Easter isn't just a holiday. It's a whole season! Easter is a 50-day liturgical season! According to the Church calendar, it is the second-longest season. Easter always occurs on the first Sunday following the first full moon on or after the spring equinox. It concludes with the Pentecost celebration.
- The Meaning of the Word "Easter" "Easter is derived from Old English and simply means the 'East.' The sun which rises in the East, bringing light, warmth, and hope, is a symbol for the Christian of the rising Christ, who is the true Light of the world." (USCCB)
- The Easter Octave The Easter Octave is the week that runs from Easter Sunday to Divine Mercy Sunday, often known as the second Sunday of Easter. Easter season is upon us, and this is an extension of Easter festivities. The time after Easter's octave is referred to as Eastertide.
- Divine Mercy Sunday The second Sunday of Easter is designated as Divine Mercy Sunday, which is based on St. Faustina Kowalska's personal revelations endorsing a specific devotion to the Divine Mercy. The Church added Divine Mercy Sunday to its calendar recently, and it has connections to both the Bible and personal revelation. When Pope John Paul II canonized St. Faustina in 2000, he made the following declaration during the ceremony: "It is important then that we accept the whole message that comes to us from the word of God on this Second Sunday of Easter, which from now on throughout the Church will be called "Divine Mercy Sunday".
- Includes the Feast of the Ascension The last part of the work that Jesus Christ started on Good Friday to redeem us is the Ascension of Our Lord, which took place 40 days following His resurrection on Easter Sunday. On this day, the risen Christ physically ascended into heaven in front of His apostles. Christ's physical ascension to heaven represents our own entry into heaven as glorified bodies—not just souls—after death and following the resurrection of the dead at the Final Judgment.
