A Walk through the Nicene Creed. . . .

Paragraph 1 – God the Father

I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.

We hold that there is only one God who exists in three Persons. Not only is our one God our King and Lord, but He is also our Heavenly Father. He has us as His children. In addition to creating all that is visible to us, He also created everything that is invisible to us. Our God and Father, despite His immense power, invites us to have a connection with Him and to participate in eternal bliss in another unseen realm called Heaven.

Paragraph 2 – The Lord Jesus

I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven,

It is the Son, the Word of God, who is the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity. It is the Father who sends this Word of God, Jesus Christ. Without being created, he was "born" and "begotten." It is really challenging to unravel this riddle. That is to say, just as the Father is everlasting, so too is Jesus entirely God. In spite of the fact that this paragraph highlights the existence of just one God, the Father and the Son are distinct persons. Jesus is entirely God and entirely man, in our opinion. God the Father sent his Word, Jesus Christ, to earth on a mission to rescue mankind and provide us with salvation.

Paragraph 3 – The Incarnation and The Virgin Mary

and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man.

The Holy Spirit's strength and Mary's free will allowed the Word of God to become flesh. The uncreated Word, Jesus Christ, by whom everything was made, came to earth to become one of us. The All-Powerful God descended into humanity and emptied Himself. In observance of the Incarnation, it is customary in the Latin Rite to bow during this passage. What Christians celebrate at Christmas is the Incarnation, which is literally the "enfleshment" of Jesus. In human history, this paragraph represents one of the most significant events. God himself became one of us.
