Understanding the Apostles Creed. . . .

The shortest and oldest creed is the Apostles' Creed, which is also one of the most widely recognized and frequently practiced. Declarative declarations of faith have been produced by Christians throughout history. Among these professions, the Apostles' Creed is among the first; it lists and restates some of the core ideas of Christian doctrine.

Article 1: I Believe in God, the Father Almighty, Creator of Heaven and Earth.

God's existence is acknowledged in the first article of the Apostles' Creed, which also describes God as a triune god—that is, as one God existing in three persons, known as the Holy Trinity. The Father, Son, and Holy Spirit comprise the Holy Trinity. It is also stated in the first article that everything in our universe was created by God.

Article 2: And in Jesus Christ, His Only Son, Our Lord.

Jesus' divinity and status as God's son are reaffirmed in the second article. Utilizing the title "Lord" in relation to Jesus Christ implies the Son is divine since the title denotes divinity and is applied to God. We can infer that Jesus is our rescuer from his Hebrew name, which means "God saves."

Article 3: Who Was Conceived by the Power of the Holy Spirit, Born of the Virgin Mary.

Since Jesus Christ was born of a human mother, the Virgin Mary, this article affirms that he possesses human nature. Jesus was not born of a human father but rather of the Holy Spirit, which gives him divine nature even though he was born of a human mother. Jesus Christ is regarded as entirely human and totally divine, and as both man and god.

Article 4: Suffered Under Pontius Pilate, Was Crucified, Died and Was Buried.

Jesus Christ was both god and human, which meant that he was capable of experiencing suffering and dying—something he did on Good Friday. Christ was crucified by Pontius Pilate and died on the cross to atone for our sins.

Article 5: He Descended Into Hell, On The Third Day He Arose Again From the Dead.

Satan's dwelling place, the Hell of the Damned, is not where Jesus descended. Rather, early Catholics used the word "hell" to refer to the hereafter. It says that even though Jesus died and entered the afterlife, on the third day he rose from the grave, demonstrating his heavenly authority. After His resurrection, Jesus Christ appeared in a glorified and resurrected body.

Article 6: He Ascended Into Heaven and Is Seated at the Right Hand of God the Father Almighty.

Following his ascension into heaven, Jesus Christ's divine and human natures were joined in the Incarnation and would never again be divided. Christ's human body will endure for all of eternity after His Resurrection. We, Catholics, believe that one day we/they will be with Jesus Christ in heaven, where He resides with His body and soul.

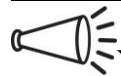
OUTREACH & EVANGELIZATION
