

What is the Moral Law?

The moral law is the collective human knowledge of what is right and wrong. It is present in every person from every period and place. The foundation of every person's God-given conscience is this law. Furthermore, Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition contain a great deal of the moral law that God has revealed. We can therefore better understand the moral law by studying our Catholic faith.

We all have free will, which is a gift from God. This implies that we have the freedom to decide what is right or wrong. Our own acts are what we are accountable for. Three components make up every moral act: the objective act, which is what we do; the subjective aim or goal, which is why we do the act; and the specific context or circumstances, which are where, when, how, with whom, the consequences, etc., in which we conduct the act.

An objectively good goal, or what we are doing, is necessary for an individual act to be morally right. Certain actions are always bad because they violate a fundamental or basic human good that should never be compromised, regardless of the motivation or purpose behind the act. Examples of actions that are always wrong include rape, torture, and the direct killing of the defenseless. When something is done for a cause other than what is right or appropriate, it is said to be innately wicked. This means that the act itself is bad.

God uses moral law to keep us and guide us away from evil and toward heaven. Our choices shape who we end up being. Selecting what is right transforms the chooser, enabling him or her to continue down the paths of virtue and form the habitus, or habits, that support Christian character. Human freedom, action, and choice are covered in the Catholic Catechism: *The more one does what is good, the freer one becomes. There is no true freedom except in the service of what is good and just. The choice to disobey and do evil is an abuse of freedom and leads to "the slavery of sin".* (Cf. Rom 6:17) (CCC#1733)
