Seven Petitions of the Lord's Prayer . . .

1) Our Father, who art in Heaven, hallowed be thy name. With all the affection of a parent, God is a parent. Some people struggle with "Our Father" because, well, their parents were imperfect. Whatever. God is with you. God is also present on this planet. "Hallowed be thy name" is how we honor that presence.

2) Thy kingdom come. Three priceless phrases to convey that deep desire for the establishment of God's rule to happen immediately. On the planet Earth. Take a look around you. Witness it in the generosity of a friend, the affection of a neighbor, and the empathy for the underprivileged. Experience the wind, rain, and sun in the natural world. Everything is changing. You should pray for it to be on the side of love.


3) Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. These phrases, which are reminiscent of what Jesus said in the Garden of Gethsemane during the suffering before his crucifixion, would be suitable to use at the conclusion of any prayer, particularly when it includes the phrase "on earth as it is in heaven." Delivering paradise to the earth. After all, everything involves God. We simply must see it.

4) Give us this day our daily bread. Together, we pray for everyone's daily sustenance. Respecting the Son who participated at the Last Supper by sharing bread and wine. Here, hoarding is not tolerated. Only enough for bread, and perhaps some more for tomorrow.

5) And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. We forgive as we are forgiven; it's a quid pro quo. That refers to the offensive thing someone said about you. Or the sibling who, after Mom passed away, took something from her without even asking if you wanted it. Or the person who talked endlessly to you in church. Please forgive again and again.
