Divine Mercy Sunday. . .

In a sequence of revelations given to St. Maria Faustina Kowalska throughout the 1930s, our Lord requested that the Sunday following Easter be set apart for a particular feast day. Since Pope John Paul II designated this feast on April 30, 2000, when St. Faustina was canonized, we have come to recognize it as Divine Mercy Sunday. In the very first revelation that the Lord gave to St. Faustina, He made clear what He intended for this feast. Her diary entry 699 has the most detailed revelation.

My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and a shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy. The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day are opened all the divine floodgates through which graces flow. Let no soul fear to draw near to Me, even though its sins be as scarlet. My mercy is so great that no mind, be it of man or of angel, will be able to fathom it throughout all eternity. Everything that exists has come from the very depths of My most tender mercy. Every soul in its relation to Me will contemplate My love and mercy throughout eternity. The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of tenderness. It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My mercy.

Jesus revealed to St. Faustina a total of 14 times why He wanted this feast. On the other hand, St. Faustina's revelations are not the exclusive basis for Divine Mercy Sunday. To be clear, it's neither a brand-new feast, nor is it particularly about St. Faustina. Even as the Octave Day of Easter approached, the Second Sunday of Easter was already a serious occasion.

The Easter Octave has traditionally been a liturgical time dedicated to contemplating Divine Mercy and forgiveness. Therefore, Divine Mercy Sunday points us to the merciful love of God that underlies the entire Paschal Mystery, which is the mystery of Christ's death, burial, and resurrection and is made real to us in the Eucharist. It also serves as a summary of the entire Easter Octave. Nonetheless, the significance of the day is underscored by the term, "Divine Mercy Sunday".
