RCIA is now 'OCIA'

For many years, the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults has been an integral part of Catholic life and vocabulary. It is the procedure by which the church receives new converts and trains catechumens and candidates. However, the most well-known acronym in the church saw a name change in November 2021 when the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) was renamed the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops.

Partly due to an English translation of the Latin term, the word "rite" was changed to "order." This idea of a continuous Catholic journey is the driving force for the decision to change the name. Each catechumen or candidate is making a lifetime commitment to the Church. This spiritual path is progressive, which is also reflected in the word "order." A journey with diverse stages, OCIA is not a one-time event. Representing the reality that becoming a Catholic involves a number of rites is one of the other reasons for the name change.

Although there are still rites in the order, the new structure is designed to welcome candidates and catechumens into a continual process of spiritual formation rather than providing them with milestones to reach baptism, first communion, and confirmation. The catechumenate is designed to be a continuous process of formation in which those who are initiated are encouraged to get involved in the parish, go to Mass and OCIA classes, and study various subjects with catechists, including creation, salvation, the sacraments, the church, and the four "last things" (hell, heaven, and hell).

Rituals like the Rite of Election, which takes place in the cathedral with the bishop, and the Rite of Sending and Entrance to the Catechumenate, both of which take place at the parish level, are still a part of the OCIA process. The scrutinies are a set of rites that come next, and then there are the Rite of Initiation. Even though these rites are not new to the church, by treating the process as a whole as an "order," the candidate or catechumen gains an understanding that the rites they receive in church or at the parish are only a portion of an ongoing journey of discipleship that will ultimately lead to baptism and confirmation, which typically take place during the Easter Vigil, and will continue during their lives.
