Understanding Baptism

The basis for all of Christian life is baptism. It is the first of the Sacraments of Initiation and serves as both a doorway to the other sacraments and a portal to life in the Holy Spirit. It removes the original sin that we are all born with; and our formal relationship with Jesus Christ and the Church is established via baptism.

Baptism is an unrepeatable, one-time gift. The baptisms of people converting to Catholicism from other Christian denominations are regarded as valid if they are carried out in accordance with the Trinitarian formula (*in the name of the Father*, *the Son, and the Holy Spirit*). However, there is conditional baptism. Meaning, that if there is reasonable doubt about the fact or validity of one's previous baptism, the sacrament is administered conditionally, i.e., the one who performs the ritual at least mentally says, "If you are not baptized," and then proceeds to confer the sacrament.

The blessings that Jesus obtained for us by dying on the cross are made available to us, granted to us, and integrated into our identity as Christians via baptism. In the person of His Son, Jesus Christ, God offers and bestows both the forgiveness of sins and eternal life through baptism. For us Catholics, the sacrament is not a mere formality; it is the very mark of a Christian because it brings us into a new life in Christ.
