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What's the difference between Catholic and Roman Catholic?

The way Catholics and Roman Catholics practice their religions is one of their primary differences. Even while both groups adhere to many of the same customs and beliefs, they differ significantly in a few important ways.

First off, "Roman Catholic" refers exclusively to the church headed by the Pope and located in Rome; "Catholic" refers to the whole Christian church. It follows that while all Catholics are not Roman Catholics, all Catholics are Catholic.

Their approaches to the Eucharistic feast represent still another distinction. The idea of transubstantiation, which holds that the bread and wine used in the Eucharist actually become the body and blood of Jesus Christ, is held by Roman Catholics. Contrarily, Catholics hold to the doctrine of consubstantiation, which holds that while the bread and wine continue to be food and drink, they also serve as the spiritual body and blood of Christ.

Furthermore, the hierarchy of Roman Catholicism is higher than that of Catholicism. The Pope, who leads the Roman Catholic Church, has the last word in issues pertaining to dogma and practice. In contrast, the organization of Catholicism is more decentralized, with bishops and other leaders holding varying degrees of authority.

Lastly, there are certain distinctions between the two groups' liturgical customs. For instance, the liturgy of Roman Catholic churches is typically more ordered and formal, emphasizing customs and rituals. On the other hand, Catholic liturgy is frequently more accommodating of regional traditions and customs.

Overall, both Catholics and Roman Catholics are dedicated to the teachings of Jesus Christ and the customs of the Christian faith, despite some significant variations between them.
