

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The Ascension

Jesus rose into heaven at the end of his earthly ministry, an occurrence known as the Ascension. With his birth, Jesus began his time on earth. His Crucifixion and death caused a three-day break in it. He went into the realm of the dead at that time and spoke the Gospel to the righteous people who had passed away before Him. This made it possible for the righteous dead, as we refer to those good and pure souls who received Christ as their Savior, to ascend to heaven. The Resurrection, often known as the raising from the dead, took place on the third day following Jesus Christ's death and burial. He preached for the next 40 days while instructing His followers on how to preach and baptize everyone.

There are various reasons why the Ascension of Jesus Christ is significant:

(1) His earthly ministry came to an end at that point. The Son was now making His way back to the Father, whom the Father had lovingly sent His Son into the world at Bethlehem. Human limitations were no longer in effect.

(2) It represented His earthly work's accomplishment. He had completed everything He had come to do.

(3) It signified the return of Jesus' heavenly glory. With the exception of one brief moment at the Transfiguration, Jesus' splendor had been hidden during His time on earth.

(4) It represented the Father's exaltation of Him. The person in whose favor the Father is pleased was elevated to a position of dignity and given the name above all names.

(5) It permitted Him to get ready a place for us.

(6) It signaled the start of His new role as the New Covenant's High Priest and Mediator.

(7) It established the framework for His return. Jesus will literally, physically, and clearly return in the clouds to establish the Kingdom just as He did when He first came.

On June 3, there will be three (3) new Josephite priests: Rev. George Agwu Liwhuliwhe, SSJ; Rev. Wisdom Ini-obong Umanah, SSJ; and, Rev. Ugochukwu Henry, SSJ. The ordination will be held at St. Luke, 4925 E. Capitol Street, SE, DC at 10:00 a.m.

Today as we celebrate the feast of the Ascension we are reminded that Christ's saving work on earth continues through his disciples...and now through us.
